Curator's Note

Two people from different corners of India, shaped by different landscapes, languages, and cultural rhythms, however, guided by an inner compass pointing toward the same source. Vrindavan Solanki and K. Muralidharan stand as distinct artistic voices — Solanki with his meditative figures rooted in the visual idioms of Gujarat, and Muralidharan with his exuberant, myth-infused worlds drawn from the rich cultural soil of Tamil Nadu. Their artistic vocabularies could not be more different. Their paths diverge as well; Solanki graduated from M.S. University, Baroda, while Muralidharan graduated from the Government College of Fine Arts in Chennai.

Yet something deeper binds them together, something older than any school of art, any institution, any stylistic movement. Both artists were born in the land where the Vedas first emerged, where the earliest ideas of dharma, philosophy, art, and human purpose were articulated. The birthplace of the Vedas is not merely a geographic point; it is a cultural pulse that has travelled across generations. These ancient values did not simply shape Indian society; they formed the first lessons whispered into the ears of children, the unspoken moral compass absorbed long before language itself took form.

These values continue to permeate us, subtle yet constant. They coexist with modernity, surviving beneath the noise of technology, progress, and an increasingly westernised world. Amid the restless movement of contemporary life, we often lose touch with the part of ourselves that belongs to the past, the ancestral voice within us that still remembers.

In the works of Solanki and Muralidharan, that voice returns. It becomes visible again. Despite their divergent sensibilities, both artists embody an inner continuity, a shared cultural consciousness. Solanki's resilient lines and vibrant silhouettes echo the contemplative essence of Indian thought, where serenity itself becomes a narrative. The diversity in his style is reflected in this exhibition; his various interpretations of the same subject showcase his range as an artist. Muralidharan's vibrant mythological forms draw from a universe where gods, symbols, and stories still breathe. His art breathes in the philosophy and ideology of the ancient world. Both of them expand in their form, but both are rooted in a timeless sensibility: that art is not merely an act of creation, but a bridge between what we are and what we have inherited.

Rabindranath Tagore once wrote:

"The roots below the earth claim no rewards for making the branches fruitful."

(Stray Birds, 1916)

These artists, too, draw from roots they never sought to claim, roots that nourish their worlds silently. Through their works, the ancient and the contemporary flow into one another, reminding us that the strings connecting us to our ancestors have not broken; they merely wait to be felt.

Together, Solanki and Muralidharan reveal that even across regions, languages, and stylistic choices, there remains a shared pulse in Indian art, a pulse born from the very origins of Indian thought, one that continues to shape the imagination of the present.


Born 1942


Vrindavan Solanki is an acclaimed Indian artist whose work is recognised both nationally and internationally for its depth and distinctive visual language. Born in Junagadh, Gujarat, in 1942, Solanki has made significant contributions to the world of contemporary art, particularly in the realms of painting and graphics. He holds a Diploma in Painting and a Post-Diploma in Graphics from the prestigious M.S. University of Baroda, completed in 1980 and 1982, respectively.

Solanki's artistic journey began early, with a deep fascination for nature, village life, and the people of his homeland. His works frequently feature the villagers of Gujarat, captured in moments of everyday life, where he uses an extraordinary interplay of light and shadow to evoke a dreamlike, almost surreal quality. His subjects, often women and men in traditional attire, are depicted with their faces left out of the composition, enhancing the focus on their clothing, posture, and the environment around them.

Throughout his career, Solanki has participated in over thirty solo exhibitions and nearly twenty group exhibitions, both in India and abroad, making his mark in key art venues. His solo shows have been hosted by distinguished galleries, including the Jehangir Art Gallery in Mumbai (1969, 1971, 1972, 1989, and 1992), Taj Art Gallery (1981), and the Continental Hotel, Curepipe in Mauritius (1991). His works have also been featured in notable group exhibitions such as those at the Academy of Fine Arts in Calcutta (1970), the Manhattan Graphics Centre in New York (2004), and the Art Trend Galleria in Hong Kong (2004).

Solanki's contributions to the arts extend beyond his exhibitions. He was a visiting faculty member at the National Institute of Design in Ahmedabad from 1982 to 1987 and was a member of the Lalit Kala Akademi, Gujarat, between 1987 and 1990. His influence on the next generation of artists is profound, as he continues to shape the cultural landscape of India and beyond. Despite his wide-ranging influence, Solanki remains deeply rooted in his community, where he continues to live and work in Ahmedabad, Gujarat.





K. Muralidharan

Born 1954

K. Muralidharan is a celebrated Indian artist known for his vibrant, imaginative works that blend mythology, folklore, and traditional Indian aesthetics with a contemporary voice. Over several decades, he has developed a distinctive style marked by luminous colours, intricate detailing, and surreal, dreamlike compositions that bring cultural stories and symbols to life. Born in Tamil Nadu, Muralidharan grew up immersed in India's artistic and cultural traditions. His fascination with temple art, folk tales, and regional architecture shaped the thematic foundation of his work. This early exposure, combined with a deep interest in mythology, continues to inform the rich visual language of his paintings.

A graduate of the Government College of Fine Arts in Chennai, he refined his skills under distinguished mentors who encouraged both classical grounding and creative exploration. Throughout his career, he has remained closely connected to his roots while continually evolving his techniques and imagery. At the core of his artistic philosophy is the belief that art bridges the past and present. His paintings celebrate the enduring relevance of cultural narratives, inviting viewers into realms where heritage, fantasy, and human spirituality merge.

His extensive participation in international group shows includes the Biennale in Mauritius in 2005, the Biennale in Dhaka in 2004, the Contemporary Indian Art Show in Texas, USA, in 2004, and the Singapore Art Festival in 2003, among many others.

Muralidharan's solo exhibitions include a travelling show in 1997 that was sponsored by a gallery in Mumbai, Chennai, and Delhi. He also held a solo exhibition at the Glasgow College of Art in 1993 and another at the Stockholm College of Arts in Sweden in 1989. Additionally, he won the All India Exhibition Award in 1985 and 1987, as well as the National Award from the Lalit Kala Academy in Delhi in 1994. His works are held by several collectors in India and abroad.



























